

Salutation

Good afternoon esteemed faculty, proud family, friends, and fellow graduates. I am honored to stand before you today as we celebrate this significant milestone.

But seriously, making the decision – at the age of 42 – to go back to nursing school, wasn't an easy one. Which makes me believe that it wasn't even my decision – it was all God. I don't think I've ever had to believe in myself and put my trust in God the way I've had to throughout this journey.

But it was that first decision – to come back to school – that set up every decision I've had to make since then. Every time we sat down to study, every time we attended a lecture, every time we cried and kept going and every time we went to clinical – whatever we had to do to get us here – we decided to work hard and not to give up on ourselves.

Answering Why

All of us here have our *why*. Why are we here? Why did we choose this path? For me, my why is my family.

I've said that I never had to believe in myself the way I've had to through this journey, but I also have to say, I've never had anyone believe in me the way my family did through nursing school. The decision to study ALL OF THE TIME, to go to every lecture, to wipe my tears when it was hard, and to get up at 4am to go to clinical – those decisions were easy, because my family was watching. I believe God allowed me to wait until now to go to nursing school, because He knew I needed my family to love me through this journey. They loved me through the hard and they celebrated with me through the good.

Lifelong Friendships

Another thing I know is, if I went to nursing school at any other time of my life, I would not have made the

lifelong friendships I've made these past two years. I wouldn't trade any of you, because God knew I needed you now!

We know the reputation that the words *Charity Nurse* brings to the table. I don't think I went one clinical day without hearing, "Oh, she's a Charity student, she knows what she's doing."

I looked up the word *charity*, and the definition reads, "generosity and helpfulness, especially toward the needy or suffering." We should strive to keep *charity* in our own hearts, to continue to work hard and not give up on ourselves. Do not forget your why, and most importantly bring your heart to every patient you help.

Your Heart Brought You Here

Our calling is extraordinary, but our calling is also fragile. Your heart brought you here: let it get you through the hard days and nights. Continue your journey, wherever that may take you, as the nurse you wanted to be on Day One of Level 1. Be who they expect us to be. Decide every day to be a *Charity Nurse*.

It Takes a Village

As a new employee at Charity School of Nursing, I was required to

attend New Faculty Orientation (NFO) over several weeks throughout my first year. One day I expressed to my Level 2 coordinator, Ms. Smart, how pleased I was with the process and topic selection used in the orientation program. This conversation led us to thinking about sharing these ideas as a presentation at a national conference.

In November, I had the privilege of attending my first Organization for Associate Degree Nursing (OADN) annual convention in Tampa, FL. Ms. Smart and I gave a 50-minute podium presentation entitled *SMP* (Structured Mentoring Program): Your Way to Faculty Retention!

The attendees were pleasantly surprised to receive Mardi Gras beads while walking into the room and listening to Mardi Gras music! By sharing our New Orleans culture, we hoped to create some excitement and engagement.

The topics we discussed included exam question writing, advising students, ways to address unsatisfactory student clinical performance, and the development of the faculty portfolio. We also shared information from a faculty survey showing the success of the faculty orientation program.

We hope our presentation will influence others to enrich their own mentoring programs and focus on retaining the staff they have. 署

I would like to share some of the exciting things we are doing in Level 2 to assist our students' learning.

This semester, we did several collaboration activities with other disciplines. Having nursing and allied health programs in the same building has really allowed for interprofessional collaboration.

Dr. Beatrice Eweni teaches Oxygenation, which covers nursing care for patients with COPD and Asthma. During her classes, she has the patient develop problems with breathing. She calls respiratory therapy for assistance. Two respiratory therapy faculty, **Rene Randall** or **Mavis Larrimer**, come from the back of the classroom and assist the patient. They explain to the students the numerous respiratory treatments that can be used to improve their lung function. The students are engaged and see the way different disciplines work together to improve patient outcomes.

Ms. Leigh Hanhart teaches nursing care for patients with cellular regulation (cancer) problems. Faculty Anne LaVance, Pharmacy, and Robin Wegener, Radiation Therapy, join her in class to share their expertise with students. Ms. LaVance talks about safety concerns when nurses are administering chemotherapy and the procedure for handling chemotherapy spills. Ms. Wegener discusses patient care associated with receiving radiation for cancer treatment. Hearing from experts in other healthcare disciplines benefits the students so much! #

A Clear Need

The response from students was overwhelming! They LOVE the dry-erase Boards! The boards are constantly in use and there was a lot of competition to reserve those rooms for study groups. Clearly there was a need for these boards!

It was Level 2 Coordinator **Pat Smart** who initially reported to us that students were requesting that dry-erase boards be installed – but that it was low on the list of priorities for the college. Once those first boards were installed, Pat told us, "My office is on the 4th floor and, when I pass these rooms, the dry-erase boards are always being used by the students! I have talked to several and they expressed how much they appreciate having the boards to help them learn. I would like to extend a big thank you for your contributions!"

Tactile Learning

The boards are really helpful in clinical group meetings and study groups and, in an increasingly digital world, dry-erase boards provide a tactile learning process that adds another dimension to students' study toolbox. The high-quality magnetic porcelain boards will last forever and won't scratch or stain like cheap melamine ones.

But most exciting of all, our leadership in providing the boards showed how useful the boards are and led to support for the project from the "CSN Fund." What a wonderful success story! #

After the School of Nursing moved to the City Park campus, the Charity Student Government Association and its responsibilities were subsumed by the greater Delgado SGA. However, student fees collected from Charity students were retained in a "CSN Fund," and in the Fall of 2023, Spectrum faculty and its members were tasked with managing the financial reserve.

These funds traditionally facilitated student activities, including covering the cost of catering various student events, purchasing senior class t-shirts, or purchasing class banners. Our goals were to continue traditions from South Claiborne while finding new ways to serve nursing students on the City Park campus.

Hearing the students and faculty

In the Fall of 2024, during a Spectrum meeting, it was suggested that the student activity fees be used to continue the project begun by the Alumni Association, and help purchase the additional Dry-Erase Boards needed to complete the 4th floor. That would require the purchase of five boards.

During the meeting, Dr. Murdock mentioned that the third floor conference rooms could also use dry-erase boards. The student members agreed and shared how helpful the boards are for studying. As a result, ten dry-erase boards were ordered at that time!

Where we are today!

This continues to evolve with the collaboration of student representatives, Spectrum Faculty, and the Alumni. After doing a walk-through with Lista, we realized we needed four more dry-erase boards to complete the 3rd and 4th floors in Building 14 (the Nursing and Allied Health building) and we also wanted to place four additional boards in Building 2 in the classrooms dedicated to nursing classes.

Markers, erasers and cleaning spray for each room have also been ordered. Like the boards provided by Alumni donations, brass plates will be mounted on each board, and these plates will read "Thanks to Delgado Charity School of Nursing RN students!"

We all have a common goal at Charity School of Nursing! That goal is to see our nursing students succeed both academically and personally! 策

Remembering the School Flag

Before entering nursing school, I spent six years on active duty in the USAF Medical Corps, working in the Flight Surgeon's Office and Emergency Room. When I arrived at CHSN, I was still in the Reserves, married and had a 2-year-old daughter. I was older than some of my instructors – hence my school nickname "Mr. Bill."

My young family lived in a trailer in LaPlace, Louisiana, and I rode a motorcycle to class every day. Some of my classes were at what was then LSUNO. I sold ladies shoes in Lakeside Mall and worked as a janitor at a local bank when I was not at school.

I sometimes regret not having time to participate in social activities at school, but I had a family to care for. I was often too tired to read the volumes of texts necessary for class, so my dear wife would read to me while I rested on the sofa in the evening. As I took my tests, I could still hear her reading to me while I answered the questions.

During clinicals, my classmates would often seek me out to help them with technical skills, like Foley or NG tube placements, blood draws or starting IV – things I had been doing for years in the Air Force. Those who were afraid to talk to patients would ask me to start conversations with a patient to break the ice. In return, they would help me with those dreaded care plans!

Starting with a Sketch

During my Senior Med-Surg semester, the students had a school flag design contest. I thought about what the school flag should include, and sketched it on a piece of paper. My design was centered around a gold Caduceus with a shadowed red cross. A Bible, or Book of Knowledge, was laid over the cross. I added a Florence Nightingale Lamp (to navigate the dark wards of the hospital) to balance the visuals. Of course, *Charity Hospital School of Nursing* had to be across the top.

I showed my design to Sister Genevieve Sullivan. She encouraged me to enter it in the contest. My design was selected, and the school arranged to have the flag made. In 1981 it was hung in the lobby of the School of Nursing.

I had hoped the flag would stay there in the lobby forever, but that was not to be. A few years later, I took my wife and daughter to the CHSN building to show them the finished flag, but it no longer hung in the lobby.

Going Forward

My nursing career proceeded. For ten years I worked in local emergency rooms, at EJGH, Westpark in Hammond, and River Parishes in LaPlace.

Then I injured my back.

The laminectomy L4-L5-S1 was successful, followed by six months of rehab. An ER position was no longer an option, so I worked as a charge nurse on the night shift in a Med-Surg Unit. After 18 months, I pivoted to Capitol Home Health as a supervisor until it closed down.

I continued my home health career with R+R Home Care in Metairie. After 4 years there, Katrina hit New Orleans and all of my patients moved or were lost to the storm. My wife and I decided to move to Jackson, MS. I finished my last twelve years doing home health with Sta-Home Health of Madison.

Wondering about the Flag

Over the years, I learned that the school joined Delgado and became Charity School of Nursing and, more recently, had moved to the City Park campus. Thinking back over the past 42 years since my graduation, I often wondered what happened to the flag.

As I was reading the last *White Cap* newsletter, I decided to just randomly email the Alumni Office. I was so pleased to find out that not only was my flag safely in the new Alumni Office, but Lista just had it dry cleaned and was wondering about its history!

Nursing school at Charity was one of the toughest times in my life, but I'm glad I did it. Even though I never got an advanced degree, I was able to do what I loved – caring for the sick and injured, and teaching patients and caregivers how to manage their illnesses. I came home each night tired, but satisfied that what I did that day was worth the effort. I thank Charity for providing me with the skills I needed, and for a career that allowed me to take care of my wife and two daughters.

I am proud to be called a Charity RN. \(\mathbb{H} \)

Evelyn "Gerry" Stanfield Stern '51 was born in Alabama. Her family was poor, and she lost her mother to mental illness at an early age, leading her to become quietly determined and stubbornly stoical. While in nursing school, she met her future husband, Charles Stern, a medical student at LSU. They married in 1955, after Charles had

returned from service in Korea, and lived in California until Charles was discharged from the Navy in 1956. After a three-year stay once again in New Orleans while Charles completed his ophthalmology residency, Gerry and her growing family moved to Natchez, MS in 1959. In Natchez she was a founder of Professional Optical Co. and, as a nurse, assisted Charles with office surgeries. She served as president of Temple B'nai Israel; president of the Temple B'nai Israel Sisterhood twice; a volunteer and board member at the Natchez Children's Home; long-time member of the Natchez Medical Auxiliary (now the Medical Alliance) and twice its president; board member of the Natchez City Cemetery; advisor to the Temple B'nai Israel youth group; a long-serving volunteer and board member at the Natchez Adams County Humane Society which named her an "Unsung Hero" in 1995. In 1984 Gerry was diagnosed with stage IV breast cancer but, characteristically, she confronted the prognosis with steely resolve and lived a full and, mostly well, life for the next 35 years. Gerry passed away in November 2020, at the age of 90. The family suggested donations in her memory go to Natchez Adams County Humane Society or Delgado Charity School of Nursing.



Jean Saint Graves '52 was born in Hammond, and played clarinet in her high school marching band. She attended Southeastern Louisiana State University and after graduating from Charity, began her nursing career at Freeport Nickel Company, where she met her husband, James. Jean returned to school and received her

Bachelor's of Science in Education with a specialty in E.D.L.D. from the University of New Orleans in 1974. She started her teaching career as a special education teacher at Strehle Elementary in Jefferson Parish. When Jim was transferred to Indonesia with Mobil Oil in 1980, Jean taught at the Jakarta International School for 3 years before returning to the US. After retirement, Jean and Jim made their home at Hide-A-Way Lake in Lindale, Texas. Jean coordinated worship and singing at various nursing homes in Lindale. She worked regularly at WeCare, which benefited the Lindale Food Pantry. She belonged to the Jokers and Pegs nurses group at Hideaway and helped facilitate immunizations in the community. Jean passed away in June 2024 at 92.



Marie Boyle Segrave '58: Born in New Orleans, Marie entered Charity right out of high school. After becoming a registered nurse, she worked with infants for her entire career, in the nursery and NICU for over 40 years. Marie was an avid, medal-winning swimmer. Her husband said she'd swim anywhere, "like a fish in water." After retiring, Marie and her

husband traveled extensively in their recreation vehicles, crisscrossing the United States dozens of times, with their beloved dog Tasha, visiting every state including Alaska, every province in Canada, the Yukon Territory, and even the Arctic Circle. She passed away in July 2024.






