### Free Your Mind at the Patricia Pankey Memorial Labyrinth



A heartfelt thank you to our Accreditation Team you led with vision and excellence, and we are deeply proud.


#### **Empowering Nurses, Transforming Lives:** The HERO Grant

We are thrilled to announce a groundbreaking step forward: a \$1.4 million H.E.R.O. Fund Grant from LDH and Ochsner Health to launch our *LPN-to-RN* Evening and Weekend Track. This pilot program will open the doors for working LPNs - starting with Ochsner employees - to become RNs through a supportive, flexible, and fully funded educational journey.

This initiative embodies our values:

- Equity in access and second chances,
- Flexibility for working professionals,
- Holistic student support financial, academic, and emotional.

We are honored to walk hand-in-hand with Ochsner Health in this effort. Their support –



### **Simulation and National Recognition**

This semester, our commitment to high-impact, real-world learning came to life through a powerful Interprofessional OB Simulation, bringing

together nursing students, respiratory therapy students, and clinical professionals for an unforgettable learning experience.

Led by faculty members Dr. Quirk and Dr. Kemp, and conducted in collaboration with **Respiratory** Program Director Rene Randall, the simulation featured a complex labor and delivery scenario, including a vaginal birth and emergency C-section. Participants included registered nurses, respiratory therapists, a physician, and a midwife—creating an authentic, interdisciplinary healthcare environment.

Nursing students practiced critical clinical skills such as:

- Recognizing signs of neonatal distress,
- Identifying maternal and delivery-related risk factors (such as suspected neonatal sepsis),
- Delivering SBAR reports to the neonatologist,
- Interpreting and acting on verbal orders,
- And communicating effectively as part of a collaborative care team.

The success and impact of the simulation didn't go unnoticed. Following the event, our faculty were invited to present their work during a Gaumard national webinar titled "Lessons We Learned," which drew over 150 healthcare educators and professionals from across the country. The presentation showcased Delgado's leadership in interprofessional education and simulationbased learning – highlighting our innovative approach to preparing students for complex, real-world care.

This is more than a teaching tool – it's a transformative experience that empowers our students

> to lead with confidence, competence, and compassion.

- Vicki Berry



## Find Your Penny

In 1977, two very anxious young women walked into Charity Hospital School of Nursing and, by chance, were thrust into a classroom together. It was a lucky day because Penny Zeigler '80 and I became friends for life.

All through school, we studied together, we encouraged each other, we were there for each other, through thick and thin. I don't know how I would have gotten through nursing school without her, and I think she feels the same about me! Forty-five years later, Penny and I are still best friends, and we both gravitated towards academia in our nursing careers. More than that, Penny has become part of the lexicon of Charity students for generations!

#### The Best Gift

I have been on the faculty at Charity since 2012, and I have been speaking to students for years. I always tell the students, "Enrolling at Charity is the BEST gift you have given to yourself." I tell them that nursing school is the hardest thing they will ever do... but will have the greatest reward!

I also say, "Look at the person on your left, and look at the person on your right."

Students expect my next statement to be: "One of you will not be here at the end of two years." But that is not the Charity Way! What I say instead is,

"The person on your left is the one you are going to call when you need help. The person on your right is the one whose call you are going to answer."

I tell them, "You CANNOT get through nursing alone. You need academic and emotional help. You need to FIND YOUR PENNY." Penny – the friend who creates synergy, who working together you both will become your best!

#### **Better Together**

As Level 1 Coordinator, I tell students at every New Student Orientation that they need to find their Penny. I share a photo of Penny and me taken at a reception in the gym of the School of Nursing on Claiborne Avenue – after the Pinning Ceremony at St. Joseph Church in 1980. We got through nursing school together!

#### Part of Charity Culture

A few years ago, two students came up to me at a final exam and were wearing





## Fall Freshmen Getting Jump Start

This summer, Level 1 Coordinator **Shena Sanders** is trying something new – a Jump Start to Level 1 workshop. Designed for students who will enter the RN program this fall, the three-day workshop, spread over several weeks, includes the topics: *Getting Organized*, *All About the Meds*, and *All About the Skills*.

On June 26, *All About the Meds* featured Pharmacology faculty **Dr. Bailey Nettles**. She gave a lecture presentation introducing a variety of concepts from abbreviations and medication rights to dosage calculations, all while making it fun. Tip: Do the Macarena to identify SQ sites!

Then the students were divided into smaller break-out groups to practice helpful math hacks and choosing correct syringe size for the dosage needed.

Faculty and Alumni Pitch In
Recent grads like Stephanie Matthew '23
and Chanika Brashears '25 were among the
group leaders, sharing their experiences and
offering encouragement. Several faculty from
other Levels, also lent a hand to make the day
a success, including Dr. Michelle Delima,
Mia Woodruff, Jamila Mathews, and
Lakesha Favis-Spencer.

Ms. Woodruff reported that her young son packed 100 bags of practice syringes and medication cups to distribute to the students!

Each student also received a packet of Jump Start printed materials, all emblazoned with the words, "eaRNed not given."

#### **Mitigating Culture Shock**

While Charity's overall retention rate is excellent, the highest number of dropouts occur in Level 1. Even previously good students can struggle when they enter nursing school. While some incoming students are LPNs or techs, many have very little exposure to the medical world. This workshop could help reduce culture shock.



Slightly out-of-date textbooks were given out so students could look them over and do a little reading this summer. Students were also introduced to some helpful online tools, because everyone doesn't learn the same way and a different approach can assist with understanding difficult concepts.


Prizes were given for students who were especially interactive in the groups. One student even got a prize for being brave enough to speak up and say, "I don't understand" – a very important thing to

know you can do!

The third session is scheduled in July. The Jump Start workshop is completely voluntary, but is very well attended by enthusiastic incoming freshmen eager to meet their future classmates, and get introduced to skills, strategies and resources for nursing school success. ❖

## SIMS Demos Provides Realistic Experiences

In March, Charity Level 3 nursing students participated in a SIMS scenario of a birth in the Virtual Hospital.

SIMS, or Simulation in Medical Science, refers to the use of realistic, simulated environments to train healthcare professionals. These simulations allow students to practice clinical skills, decision-making, and teamwork in a safe, controlled setting. Using high-tech mannequins, this training can provide a connection between theoretical knowledge and the real-world.

The scenario at CSN included pre-eclampsia in the mother and respiratory distress in the newborn. Charity alumni and Nurse Practitioner **Tiffany Lorrio Williams '10**, was on hand to lead the birth scenario along with two neonatologists from Ochsner Baptist, **Dr. Omotola Uwaifo** and **Dr. Krystina Gabriel**.

Some Level 3 students were active players in the scenario while some were in the active observer role, watching on live video. A few Level 1 students were also able to watch.

The mannequins in the virtual hospital have breath sounds and vital signs, and talk (with the help of faculty members). The baby mannequin in the scenario actually exhibited retractions and stridor. To add to the realism, **Respiratory students** were on hand to be called in when needed.

Simulation scenarios allow students to have hands-on experiences that they could never get in an actual hospital as a student, like assisting with intubation of the newborn. Afterwards, all the students participated in





a debriefing – an important element in SIMS training. Tiffany and the neonatalists answered questions and talked through different approaches to the clinical events. Level 3 Nursing Instructor and Simulation Coordinator **Dr. Alicia Quirk** also used the session as an opportunity to challenge the students to use critical-thinking skills. ❖

## An Opportunity to Serve: Level 4 Students Shine in Mass Casualty Exercise

When we were offered an opportunity to participate in a Mass Casualty Exercise at Ochsner-Baptist, Charity's Level 4 responded! Despite a snow day and date change, three clinical sections of Level 4 students (accompanied by their three instructors – us!) were able to participate in the January 29 event.

At Charity, Level 4 focuses on care of the patient with acute life-threatening conditions, so it was a true application of the concepts the students are learning in the classroom.

As New Orleans was preparing for the influx of people at the Super Bowl, the goal of this exercise was to facilitate Ochsner-Baptist's preparation in the event of a mass casualty. Interdepartmental representatives – including Emergency Preparedness Specialists, ED nurses and educators, Infection Preventionists, Registration Specialists, and Security and Safety Analysts – worked together to run the drill and to identify areas in need of improvement.


#### **Briefing and Assignments**

At the start of the day, the students were briefed by Rebekah Vinson,
Supervisor of Emergency Preparedness
System at Ochsner Health. They were then divided into groups representing the patients presenting to the hospital, and their family members searching for information. One student was selected to serve as a VIP patient who would undergo a different process for registration and treatment.

For the triage, student "patients" were given cards listing their symptoms and encouraged to actually act out chest pain, shortness of breath, abdominal pain, etc. Some could have won an Academy Award – they were that convincing! Student "family members" deserved accolades as well – depicting anxious and desperate loved ones.

"Patients" were taken to a Decon Tent where they were treated for suspected anthrax. Then they moved to the official registration area and were





placed in treatment areas.

At the end of the day, there was a debriefing called the Hot Wash. Rebekah led the discussion and gave each department an opportunity to share their thoughts about the day. It was wonderful for the students to witness such empowering

conversation of real nurses and healthcare specialists identifying opportunities for positive change.

The students were praised for their participation – these Charity students were instrumental in making the Mass Casualty Exercise a great success! ❖

provided door prizes and an afternoon cookie break. ❖














## Spectrum Offers Service, Bonding and Fun!

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
